Local charitable organizations are invited to submit an application describing their funding request and grants are awarded based on community need, organizational transparency, and the measurable, tangible impact of programming.

2019 grant recipients will be announced in the weeks leading up to the race.

2018 Grant Recipients Recap

BRAM Home Based Care Project Robertson Community

2018 grant was used for community awareness around HIV & TB testing as well as screening tools. This is important to the community because it breaks stigma, discrimination, and cultural barriers. It creates gender equality and encourages health seeking behavior.

The outcome of this grant was earlier detection and treatment of TB & HIV as well as creating an aware and educated community.

McGregor Young Warriors Cycling Academy Robertson Community

2018 grant was used to build a pump track for the BMC kids of McGregor.

McGregor is an impoverished community and this grant will provide their children with a fun/safe area to ride their bikes, stay fit, and get healthy.

24 months ago, multi-Epic finisher Max Menzies created "McGregor Warriors" which is a cycling academy supporting a youth mountain bike team and a BMX camp that serves 250 kids.

Gloryland: Khayalethus Empowerments Projects

Robertson Community

2018 grant was used to create space for two community programs that will serve the unemployed, pensioners, youth, and children of this area.

The first community program is a computer training facility and the second is a hands-on woodwork, welding, and building project.

This grant enables those living in poverty to gain critical skills to become self-sufficient and generate income improving their wellbeing and the lives of others.





2018 Grant Recipients Recap, Continued

Charles and Catherine Sheepers Educare Worcester Community

2018 grant was used for the following:

- Building a new classroom.
- Establishing security measures for classrooms.
- Playground modifications for grass pitch.
- Covering costs of land and servicing from municipality.

This organization serves 50 children from 1-6 years in age and this grant improved facilities to help better serve and educate children, giving them the best possible chance at growth.

DeafNET Centre of Knowledge Worcester Community

2018 grant was used to create Basic Sign Language Training about Deafness and an Awareness campaign. The goal was to increase public awareness of deaf issues, people, and culture and bring people together as one community.

Why is this important? Worcester remains the "Care Capital" of the province and many Deaf live and study there and need access to facilities during their stay. However, there is little or no development to improve access to general services for the Deaf.

This grant created programming to bridge the existing communication gap that currently exists in South African Society.

Ma's-vir-Wellington Wellington Community

2018 grant was used for the following:

- To appoint 4 additional assistants for their Early Childhood Development Programme. These children cannot afford day-care or pre-school and will be left to play in the street where they can get hurt or abused if they cannot attend school.
- To buy food (breakfast and lunch) as part of their feeding project for 164 children.
- To appoint 4 social care field workers to assist families and children in need when abused.

Their goal is to be able to teach, feed, and care for these 164 children. If they can lay a good foundation in their forming years, this could help kids make better decisions later in life.






